Feedback received from students and stake holders is appropriately conveyed to the members of board of studies. The students' recommendations are discussed during university meetings and accepted while framing the syllabus for the new session. During interactions with other teachers at workshops/ seminars etc, all the teachers also share their ideas pertaining to curriculum. A Performa for Annual Performance Appraisal Report is developed by IQAC for teachers. It essentially has a feedback component of the students as well. On the basis of inputs gathered from IQAC, college develops a mechanism of complimenting and rewarding the best teacher and the best researcher. IQAC motivates the faculty to submit more number of major and minor research project proposals to various funding agencies. IQAC encourages the faculty members to increase their participation in national/international level research oriented programmes like refresher/training programmes on research methodology, conferences, seminars and workshops. The college sanctions duty leave to the faculty for attending seminars, workshops and conferences. All the letters or notifications sent by UGC to the college are discussed with coordinator IQAC first and then replied to UGC only after IQAC's mediation.

• Admission and examination related issues of the college are also discussed with IQAC first and then decided accordingly.

2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

The Lecture Method is obviously considered the most common mode of teaching, when the teachers are supposed to cover the substantial syllabi within a given period. However, a teacher makes all the efforts to involve students in a discussion on the topic on which the lecture is delivered.

- ❖ The Teachers encourage fully participation of the students during lectures. Students are prompted to put questions, give answers as well as comment on the issues being discussed in the class. Through this method the learners also learn to put their ideas in a connected and reasonable manner. All such Exercises enhance the inquisitiveness of the students and make them confident enough to express their views.
- ❖ Internet is regularly used by the teachers to acquaint themselves of the latest information. The UGC sponsored INFLIBNET works effectively in aiding this procedure.
- ❖ Teachers even use PowerPoint presentations to ensure proper involvement of the students.
- ❖ Field trips are regularly arranged for the students. The teachers alongwith students regularly visit book fair held at Pragati Maidan (New Delhi), Science City in Jalandhar and GNDU, PU research labs.
- * Case-studies during class room interaction.
- Group Discussions during tutorials.
- Students present papers in conferences/seminars.
- Students are provided extra knowledge by discussing various other topics and they are given tasks, in the form of assignments, to gather knowledge related to innovations/ inventions in various subjects.
- ❖ For the benefit of students, teachers occasionally use audiovisual aids as well as material available on the internet.
- To enhance the knowledge of students, experts in relevant
